This week we will focus on the elements of art in our sketchbooks. Some or all elements of art can be found in every work of art. The elements of art: Line, Space, Form, Texture, Value, Color, Shape

Line-The path of a moving point.

1. Draw a continuous curving line, try not to include any straight lines, and try to fill the page. Think of it as a continuous ribbon.
The example shows you the beginning stage of this drawing. It will continue to fill the page.

2. Space-Space is made up of positive areas of space and negative areas of space. Positive space is the object in a work of art. Negative space is the area within and around the object in a work of art.
If you have colors use either warm or cool colors to fill the negative space in your continuous line drawing from yesterday. If you do not have colors use a light shading in the negative space. (look up warm and cool colors if you are unsure)
